Tales of a 70-year-old Landy


Bryn my owner has been doing some research and it is my privilege to share it with you. I have never been in print before – how exciting!

I came off the production line in Birmingham on November 9th 1954 and within a week I was in a posh showroom in Shrewsbury – Vincent Greenhouse. I was there for a few weeks before Mr John Edwards of The Buttery, Wellington, bought me and took me home. He must have been a very rich man because I would have cost him around £500 then.

Anyway there was no need to worry. I had a very happy time the two years I was there before I was purchased by a Mr Instone of Church Street, Broseley and then onto Mr Jukes of Lydbury North for a five years just carrying fruit and veg – a doddle, really.

I was very lucky to survive, to be honest. A lot of my friends who came off the production line the same day were destined for hard labour as builders' trucks or tow trucks. They were worked very hard and did not survive and were sent to scrap.

Most were shipped abroad to work carrying anything from bamboos to bananas – one even has a thatched roof by now!



Bryn does complain every now and then that I am a little thirsty, but I remind him that I was made when petrol was five shillings a gallon – not £6.20. Anyway, I am not too keen on this low octane stuff. Bryn does add a bit of go-go juice to the fuel to get me going properly. I do cough and splutter a bit first thing in the morning but once I get warmed up and going, I'm ok.

Don't get me wrong, I am no oil painting – not a show pony by any means. I hate 'show ponies' – grown men poking around and counting my rivets, making sure they're right shape and in the right place. I just want to be left alone in my working clothes.

Bryn's always on about something. He was having a whinge the other day about the cost of my new tyres, but I told him they will last longer than you. And there's no road tax or that awful MOT where a man pokes, prods and shakes everything around and virtually stands on my brakes bringing me to a shuddering halt. But Bryn does take me for a light touch MOT – to make sure I am safe on the road and don't hurt anybody.

I've had a very good life here in Llandyrnog – Bryn keeps me in a nice warm shed and we have had a lot of adventures together.

I needed a new coat to cover my back and because I'm a bit of an odd shape, I had to have one made to measure. We drove all the way to Llanfairfechan – that's a long way, but fair play to Bryn he stopped by the sea in Colwyn Bay to make sure that I was ok and not too hot and that my oil was ok. I think he disappeared too for a coffee somewhere while I prepared myself for the second half of this epic journey. I was not happy because everyone was overtaking me but I was doing my best. Fair play to Bryn he took me home the scenic route, over hills and dales, with a few stops to admire the view and cool down a bit. I'm much happier tootling along at 40mph.

I remember once we went on an adventure to Ysbyty Ifan of all places over what Bryn told me were the Denbigh Moors (you live in a beautiful area). Uncle Phil was

with us that day and I had to work a little bit harder to carry the two, They shouted at each other all the way and laughed in between, so obviously they were not arguing. I have been told that I'm a bit vocal myself, so maybe that's why they were shouting. I was allowed to join in a convoy with a few of Bryn's tractor friends. We went for a jolly and stopped in Betws y Coed for an ice cream – for me and him to cool down. Back to Ysbyty and I was given a rosette – I'm still not sure what for to be honest, just getting there I suppose. It's my pride and joy and the only one I have – I am proud of it.

I did have a very embarrassing moment in Llanrhaeadr show once. Bryn had been out with his tractor friends and we went straight into the main ring. The ring was very small, with square corners, and well I'm a big girl and need a lot of room to turn – a whole field. Much to my embarrassment, when I reached the corner of the ring – I had to reverse back to swing round the corner and follow the tractor in front of me. I learnt my lesson and cut every corner after that.

Oh dear, I very nearly went on fire once. As we were heading towards the Ponderosa for lunch, the heavens opened. Bryn had to put the windscreen wiper on (I have got two). Oooo it got hot and started smoking. Coral who was with us on her way to meet her husband for lunch was in a right state and had her hand on my door handle about to jump out. Bryn kept his cool and got the extinguisher out ready for action, but a damp cloth sorted it all out. Then we had no wiper, so Coral had to shout instructions – to me – to you, along this narrow lane. We got to the Ponderosa eventually, and the sun shone!

Bryn took my wiper motor off and sent it to a Mr Fuggles who took it apart and rebuilt it. Mr Fuggles makes a living out of fettling with wiper motors. You see, I was built well before what they now call the 'throw-away society'. There is a man in a shed who can mend most of my parts if I'm poorly.



I was tasked once with looking after a very important lady on one of Bryn's charity runs – Kate Miles, manager of the DPJ Foundation which he supports. All was well until Bryn, for some reason, swung my steering much too quickly full lock to the right and the door flicked off its hinges. Well how embarrassing! I have no seat belts, remember, but all was well – it was a very sharp right. Sharp left would have been a disaster. Kate just laughed it off and keeps reminding Bryn of her Land Rover experience.

But I must admit I enjoy helping Bryn and his mates with charity work. They work hard to make sure it happens every year. I do my bit carrying everything that is needed and whizzing around to make sure everyone is in the right place at the right time. It's good fun but I do get tired though – my cv joints hurt and it takes me a while to get over it.

Where to next? Well I have no idea. I don't want to leave Bryn and Anwen since they have been so good to me. Bryn will be too old soon to get on and off his little tractor. I've noticed he's struggling a bit to get his leg over the gearbox, – so who knows I may well may be his carriage of choice for future adventures. But I know he's got another younger one hidden away somewhere. That makes me sad – is he going to give up on me? Anwen is sure that he won't, so I hope she's right.

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This is one of my favourite puddings.

Peach Meringue

Base 8oz digestive biscuits 4oz margarine 1oz caster sugar

Crush biscuits, melt margarine in saucepan and add biscuits and sugar. Smooth out in dish and bake at 180 °C for 15–20 minutes.

Filling

8oz can peaches 1oz cornflour 4oz caster sugar 2 egg yolks 1oz butter

Drain juice from peaches and make up to $\frac{1}{2}$ pint with water.

Put cornflour, sugar and egg yolks in a bowl and add a little juice and stir.

Put rest of juice in a saucepan and when nearly boiling pour over the mix in the bowl and mix. Return to pan, boil, then simmer for 1 minute. Remove from heat and add the peaches and butter, stir until the butter has dissolved. Put in the baked biscuit base.

Meringue

2 egg whites 2oz caster sugar

Whisk egg whites, fold in sugar, spread on top of peaches.

Bake at 150 for ½ hour.

The Wright Stuff





Let me tell you a story about my new lodger – Neville. The garden is tucked up for the winter and the recent bad weather means I am not out and about as much, only doing garden chores and my tools are stacked away in the shed. That is apart from one lonely bucket which I forgot and was left by the outside tap. One evening I noticed it was full of rainwater, and I decided to tip this out to give it a thorough clean before stacking it with the others. Imagine my surprise when something moved from under a few leaves which had blown into the bucket and sunk to the bottom. A small grey, brown creature, with dark spots, a long 'paddle shaped' tail, four legs and a dumpy head. I see quite a few frogs in the garden hopping under the hedge for safety from predators, but it wasn't a frog. A quick look at Google and I found it was a smooth newt. I have never seen one in my garden and was rather surprised it had decided to make its home in an old 'tubby' bucket. How did it get in there and how does it get out? What does it eat? So many questions.

Neville obviously felt my bucket was a good place to sit out the winter. I added more leaves to provide shelter and a couple of sticks in case he did want to crawl out of the bucket. He has been there a few weeks now. I make sure the water doesn't run out and I have got into the habit of checking Neville every day.

Newts are protected in the UK under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981. It says it's illegal to sell, trade, barter, exchange or transport smooth newts for sale. What does Neville eat? Insects, caterpillars, worms and tadpoles, but these are few and far between in winter. Do they hibernate? Yes, they do apparently. They find sheltered places, under logs or rocks or in compost heaps, so why is Neville in my 'tubby' bucket? They are amphibians so can live on land and in water.

I don't have a pond: we had a large deep pond in the garden when we lived in Formby, until I was around 7 or 8 when I accidently fell in. My father was looking out the kitchen window at the time, saw what happened and immediately rushed out and pulled me out by my long-plaited hair. My school skirt had ballooned up and formed an air pocket, so I had bobbed back up just in time for him to grab my hair. Rather unceremoniously I was dragged out. After that incident my mother gave strict instructions for the pond to be drained and it remained like that until we moved.

So back to Neville; a friend who works for RSPB told me he will have to be evicted from his bucket as if we have freezing weather he will die if the water freezes. So, I will have to remove him and tip the bucket gently out under a sheltered hedge for him to find a more suitable place for his hibernation. I just hope he isn't gobbled up by any local birds, hedgehogs or indeed chickens. Release day approaches and I wish Neville, as I do to you dear reader, a Happy and Healthy 2025.

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Storm Darragh



The village unfortunately suffered the impact of Storm Darragh on 8 December, following high winds and heavy rain. Many homes were left without electricity, some for several days.



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Tuesday Club

The members had an excellent Christmas lunch at 'Y Ddau Ful' cafe, Llanbenwch Caravan Park, Llanfair DC. Although it wasn't the traditional Christmas menu, the food was excellent. Thanks to Sara and all the staff for their warm welcome.

The next meeting will be at 2pm, Wednesday, 15 January, at the Cocoa Rooms. The guest speaker will be Eirian Jones from Citizens Advice. A warm welcome will be given to new members!

Matters discussed in the December meeting of Llandyrnog Community Council

- Although the community policeman was not present, it was requested that he considers increasing his presence in the Llanychan exit from Llandyrnog, possibly to monitor speed following a recent incident.
- The bench is on order and will be delivered at end of January, therefore the fixing of the base can be programmed.
- A new box has been made to keep the audio equipment safe – this has been made by local craftsman Mr Hession.
- Since most councillors are shareholders in the shop, the Community Council has applied for dispensation to discuss any matter regarding the shop without declaring an interest, and this has been granted.
- Having prepared a draft budget, it was decided that to cover inflation and additional costs, the council requests a 5% increase in its precept. This is the money received from DCC to enable the council to carry out its statutory duties, and the total is £12993.
- It has been decided to source quotations for a new electricity supplier for the Cocoa Rooms. The standing charge is a business rate charge that is particularly onerous and may lead to having to increase hiring charge. Early indications are that alternative suppliers may well lead to a substantial saving.
- Draft business plan it has been decided to draw up a business plan to protect the community council reserves. Cllr Borthwick has prepared a draft which, after consultation, will be offered for adoption. It will show that the community council is inclusive and community-led.
- Although it had been questioned whether or not the community council should commit to paying the standing charge and water

usage on the allotments, it was decided to proceed, providing that DCC opens the allotments to the whole village and not limit them to DCC tenants. This would need to be written into any agreement.

- There were two planning applications:
 - Old Coach House, Plas Bennett gazebo and shed – no objections
 - Wern Farm retrospective application change of use of stable to dog day care and boarding facility, continued use of manage as exercise area.

The council has asked many questions to allow members to make an informed decision, but the replies were not clear, especially regarding overnight supervision and noise issues. It's best left to the Case Officer to decide whether the replies received from the applicant's agent addressed his concerns.

 DCC has failed to clear the ditch by Capel Dyffryn despite offering a glimmer of hope October that the task would be undertaken. The failure led to a torrent of surface water during Storm Darragh crossing the chapel car park, leading to a clearing-up operation before it could be used. The water was coming down from Cross Keys. The Clerk explained that the solution at that point requires some serious engineering work and considering the DCC budget, it was unlikely to



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
